Beloved in Christ, God's arms are always stretched open wide to welcome the wandering ones home. In Christ + your sins are forgiven. You have a place in God's house forever..



*Gospel: Luke 13:31-35:

Neither Herod's plotting nor Jerusalem's resistance to maternal love will deter Jesus from his sacrificial mission.

The Holy Gospel according to Luke, the thirteenth chapter, beginning with the thirty first verse.

Glory to you, o Lord.

At that very hour some Pharisees came and said to [Jesus,] "Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you." ³² He said to them, "Go and tell that fox for me, 'Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work. ³³ Yet today, tomorrow, and the next day I must be on my way, because it is impossible for a prophet to be killed outside of Jerusalem.' ³⁴ Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing! ³⁵ See, your house is left to you. And I tell you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, 'Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.'"



The third verse of today's anthem is taken from the ending section of "St. Patrick's Breastplate", also known as the "Lorica of St. Patrick". A lorica is a type of prayer of protection (literally meaning "breastplate" in Latin) which was popular in Celtic countries. According to tradition, St. Patrick wrote this prayer in 433 A.D. to strengthen himself with God's protection as he prepared to confront and convert Loegaire, the High King of Ireland. In it are some similarities to Paul's exhortation to "put on the whole armor of God" (Ephesians 6:10-18). The words were translated into English verse by Cecil Frances Alexander in 1889 at the request of the Dean at the Chapel Royal of Dublin Castle and set to two traditional Irish tunes, "St. Patrick" and "Deirdre". The resulting hymn is known as "I Bind Unto Myself Today". In today's anthem, the words are set to the Scottish Gaelic tune, Bunessan.

*Words of Institution:


*Invitation to Communion:
