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St Patrick

Most people know St. Patrick's Day as a day to drink Guinness, wear green, and celebrate all things Irish. But few know the true story of the patron saint of Ireland.

St. Patrick was born Maewyn Succat around 385 in Kilpatrick, Scotland. At the age of 14 he was captured during a raid of his hometown and taken to Ireland to work as a slave, herding sheep. At the time he was captured Ireland was inhabited predominantly by Druids and pagans. Maewyn learned the language of the Irish and their lifestyle.

During Maewyn's servitude in Ireland he never forgot about God and prayed to him every single day. It is said that he would sometimes pray over 100 times a day.

Six years after he had been captured, God came to Maewyn in a dream and told him to leave Ireland by going to the coast. Maewyn did as God instructed and boarded a ship back to Britain where he was reunited with his family.

Once home, Maewyn had another dream in which the people of Ireland were asking him to come back and teach them about God. So Maewyn began studying to become a priest and was ordained by St. Germanus.

By the time he was ordained bishop, Maewyn had taken the name Patrick, and was sent to Ireland to bring the word of God to the Irish people.

Patrick preached for 40 years and converted all of Ireland. He worked many miracles and wrote of his love for God in "Confessions." After years of living in poverty, traveling, and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461.

Patrick died at Saul, where he had built the first church.

Here are some quotes from Saint Patrick:

"I arise today through God's strength to pilot me; God's might to uphold me, God's wisdom to guide me, God's ear to hear me, God's word to speak for me, God's hand to guard me, God's way to lie before me, God's shield to protect me afar and near, alone or in a multitude".

"I cannot keep silent, nor would it be proper, so many favors and graces has the Lord deigned to bestow on me in the land of my captivity".

"The love of God and his fear grew in me more and more, as did the faith, and my soul was roused, so that, in a single day, I have said as many as a hundred prayers and in the night, nearly the same".

See Through The Scriptures Bible Workshop- March 29- Our Redeemer's

Pastor Brad Ulgenes will lead a six hour Bible workshop using a manual called *See Through The Scriptures* on <u>Saturday, March 29 from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM</u>. The cost of the manual for the workshop will be \$15. For an additional \$5 participants can order a workbook (not mandatory) that can be used for personal study following the workshop. Free or loaner manuals will be available for those who request one. Their will be Jimmy John's sandwiches for lunch for purchase.

See Through The Scriptures makes the Bible more accessible by taking readers step by step through the entire biblical narrative, especially the Old Testament, putting everything in clear context. 44 full color teaching graphics are used to help people grasp and remember the key events and concepts of the Bible, especially the three major covenants in the Old Testament and how Jesus in the New Testament fulfills those covenants. See Through the Scriptures is part of the Crossways/Divine Drama series authored by Pastor Harry Wendt.

Students will gain a new appreciation for everything that preceded Jesus in order to more fully understand the deeper meaning of Jesus' ministry and his message of love and servanthood. This workshop is perfect for students who have not studied the Bible before and will teach mature Bible readers new Biblical concepts and overarching themes in the Bible to enrich their faith.

Pastor's Perspective

As we move from the bright and hopeful season of Epiphany into the more somber, reflective season of Lent, we find ourselves transitioning from a time of light and new beginnings to a period of deeper introspection and renewal. Epiphany has called us to witness the light of Christ revealed in the world, while Lent beckons us to return to God with repentance, humility, and holy lament.

Lent is not just about personal reflection but about inviting us to sit with our grief and sorrows. In a society that often pushes us to ignore our suffering or pretend it doesn't affect us, holy lament invites us to take a different approach. We are reminded through Scripture that lament is a natural and necessary expression of faith. The Bible is filled with examples of lament, from the Psalms to the prophets, where God's people pour out their hearts, express their pain, and ask the hard questions about suffering—both personal and global. Holy lament is a spiritual practice that encourages us to be honest with God. It is an invitation to name our griefs, whether they are large or small, and to bring them to God's loving embrace. It is a practice that acknowledges there are things in life too great for our hearts to bear alone. Through lament, we discover that God is not displeased with our tears or questions but holds us tenderly, comfortingly, and even weeps with us. Lament leads us into a deeper understanding of a God who is larger than our grief and who, in the end, transforms our sorrow into holy joy, renewed hope, and new life.

As we walk through these 40 days of Lent, we are invited to rediscover the faithful discipline of holy lament. We may want to reflect on the questions: Are we truly comfortable with holy lament? How do we express our grief? Is it a personal journey, or do we lament together as a community?

Holy lament encompasses both personal and communal expressions of sorrow. Personal lament occurs when we face situations that shatter our lives or weigh heavily on our hearts. These can be the quiet griefs that often go unnoticed in the hustle of daily life but still require attention. And then there are the deep, heart-wrenching laments—the ones that feel insurmountable. We can bring them to God knowing that our community of faith is here to support us in those times. Community lament is when our collective voices cry out in response to the pain and suffering of the world—whether through injustice, oppression, or tragedy that affects an entire city, state, or nation. In these moments, we stand together, finding strength and comfort in the knowledge that God hears our cries and holds us in our collective sorrow.

During this season of Lent, we are called to lean into this holy practice, whether in solitude or in the company of others. It is a time to ask tough questions and find solace in the truth that we are not alone in our lament. As we journey through Lent, we remember that the road leads us to the foot of the cross, where Jesus, through His own death, transforms all of our mourning and grief into a hope that does not disappoint. In this season, we walk with the assurance that our mourning is not without purpose. We do not grieve as those without hope, for Jesus's death on the cross assures us that even in our deepest lament, resurrection and new life are always on the horizon.

Let us walk this Lenten journey together, learning to express our grief, find comfort in God's presence, and trust that in the midst of our sorrow, God will lead us into the joy and hope of the resurrection.

New Testament Bible Study

With the start of the new academic year, *New Testament Bible Study will continue on Sundays at 10:45 am following worship. Classes will gather in the Guild room*. We will once again be exploring the historical content, original sources, and the materials used in the writings that formed the New Testament Canon. Through a chronological reading, we will experience the timeline within the New Testament. This will be an opportunity to encounter the contents of each book, discuss the historical background, author, context, audience, and purpose (who, where, when, why). We will discover themes and messages within each of the Gospels, Pauline Epistles, Acts, and Revelation.

It is not required, but I do suggest having a good Study Bible. If you have one already, wonderful. If you are interested in getting a new one, I recommend either *The New Oxford Annotated Bible with Apocrypha 5th Edition NRSV* or the *Lutheran Study Bible* in the NRSV translation.


